Spiritual Nurture Discussion

On the first Firstday (Sunday) of each month after worship, friends gather in the Annie H Wilson room to share in a discussion of the many aspects of experiencing God's spirit. It is challenging to notice the breath of the Spirit as it brushes your cheek and then put words to the experience. And yet, as we turn our attention to the spiritual dimension of our lives our inner ear sharpens. When we strive to put words to what is heard and felt and then share with friends, we grow in our understanding and deepen the love for one another in our faith community.

This is a time of personal reflection and learning from one another as we listen with an open and respectful heart. Come as you can and in doing so, we grow together as a Meeting of diverse and loving members who know and care for one another.

PMM Right Relationship with Indigenous Peoples Working Group

Our annual Palm Sunday and Easter donation this year was sent to CALIFORNIA HERITAGE: Indigenous Research Project to help reestablish a landbase for the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe.

Santa Cruz Friends Meeting put out the call for help to all Quaker Meetings in the U.S. to participate spiritually and financially in an historic Quaker moment: Homeland Return of the Sierra Friends Center (Woolman) to the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe. The land that Sierra Friends Center has operated from is the site of an ancestral Nisenan village called Yulića. These 232 acres, as well as the surrounding land known as “Nevada City, California”, were taken from Indigenous peoples during the Gold Rush and sold to settlers who were colonizing the area. In 1887, Tribal Chief Charley Cully obtained a land allotment of 75 acres, located on Cement Hill, about 1.5 miles from downtown Nevada City, to be put into trust of the Nisenan Tribe. In 1913, this tribal land was converted into the Nevada City Rancheria by Executive Order of President Woodrow Wilson. Through this order, the Tribe, though living in extreme poverty, was also granted federal recognition as a Native American reservation and the right to self-govern. Then, following the U.S. Congressional enactment of the Rancheria Act of 1958, which disbanded the Rancheria System in California, the United States illegally “terminated” the Nevada City Rancheria in 1964, revoking individual rights and status afforded to “Indians.” The U.S government sold the reservation land at auction and left the Nisenan homeless.

A group of Quakers purchased the land in the 1960s for the Woolman School educational programs. The Woolman school closed in 2016 after several attempts to continue without finding a financially viable program, then enduring both Covid and forest fire setbacks to reopening. The board of trustees has entered into a purchase agreement with the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe through the Tribally-led California nonprofit, [California Heritage: Indigenous Research Program \(CHIRP\)](https://chirpca.org). The Tribe has not had land since 1964 when the Federal Government illegally terminated the Nevada City Rancheria Nisenan Tribe and sold their reservation at auction. **This is the Tribe’s best opportunity to re-establish a tribal homeland and may support their efforts toward Federal re-recognition.**

Our donations were matched 1 for 1 by a generous donor when they were received. The overall fundraising goal is \$2.4 million; includes the purchase price, government-mandated improvements, and an operating endowment. First phase of this effort is to raise \$1.5 million by April 4, 2024. As of April 2 \$1,389,700 has been raised.

At the end of February, with some help from adult members of Meeting, our children packed thirty-six care bags for the unhoused who would spend the night at Church of the Mall. Each care bag contained water, tissues, apple sauce with a spoon, a granola bar, nuts, peanut butter crackers and an encouraging note written by our children. The children discussed the testimony of Equality and the meaning of equity before packing the bags. The needs of others offered an opportunity to put into practice the act of caring and sharing.

News from PYM

Home Repair Grants for Montgomery County Residents Application period closes April 12

Representative Greg Scott sent out the following information:

Last week, Montgomery County officially launched the Whole Home Repairs Program (WHRP). WHRP focuses on essential enhancements, aiming to provide significant, life-improving changes to residents' living spaces.

This program is administered by the Montgomery County Commissioners and their department of Health and Human Services. It opened on February 22, 2024, for individuals to submit applications. People may visit my website www.RepGregScott.com/Housing or the County's [the WHRP website](#) to learn more. The WHRP aims to provide eligible Homeowners in Montco with grants of up to \$50,000 per owner-occupied unit to address habitability and safety concerns. The [application](#) period will be open for an initial 50-day period; **closing April 12, 2024**. To be eligible, applicants must own and live in a home needing repairs in Montgomery County, and the **household income must not exceed 80% of the Area Median Income based on household size**.
