be planted near the location of the his latest favorite book to the This spring and summer people experienced a strong odor of cat urine in the Annie H Wilson room and musky odor in the Meeting House. The intensity of the odor went up and down with the humidity. The odor at times was so strong that it precluded from people from using the building even when fans were placed in the windows. Investigation determined that the odor was coming from the crawlspaces below the floors. These spaces are stone walls and dirt floors. Moisture in this area in the form of high humidity (60 to 85%) during the summer is

causing mold to grow in the soil and on the wood. Additional moisture is coming from the basement where water comes in through the front wall after rain.

At a called Meeting in August the Monthly Meeting agreed to proceed with a project to address the moisture issues that are enabling mold to grow and odors to come into the buildings. In September the property committee evaluated contactor proposals. In a called Meeting on September 2nd, the Monthly Meeting agreed to sign a contract with Basement Waterproof Specialist to do the work. The cost of the project will be approximately \$53,000. It is hoped that the job can be done before Thanksgiving. A more complete record about the crawlspace and reasons for choice of contractor can be found on the website in the news and events section. Support of community Bail Fund


At 9th Month business meeting the Peace and Social Concerns Committee brought the request to the Monthly Meeting to send a \$1,000 donation to Montgomery County Reuniting Family Bail Fund.

Vincent O'Grady and John Schatz have been active members of this organization that advocates for abolition of bail for non-violent offenders and provides bail to those who are currently incarcerated and waiting for their hearing. The average bond is \$200 or less. The Monthly Meeting held over the request for one month so that those who have not attend prior meeting on bail bond issues can speak with Vincent or John to learn more. John will be attending this month's Peace and Social Concerns meeting on the first Friday of the month at 7pm.
