Notes from Worship & Ministry

These are hard times that we live in. The deep divides within our society here in the United States and in countries around the world are causing suffering and death by; poverty, neglect, racism, war, driven by fear and hatred. A new book will be made available in our Meeting Library that poses interesting questions – We survived the End of the World. – Lessons from Native America on Apocalypse and Hope. By Steven Charleston, member of Choctaw Nation, Episcopal bishop of Alaska and past dean of Episcopal Divinity school.

The word apocalypse in our modern culture has been window dressed into an entertainment genre of horror films with action characters. The Greek word apokaluptein means to "uncover" or "reveal". It also has the meaning of a time or event when those who are experiencing what is being revealed will have new understanding.

Times of apocalypse have occurred through out human history; i.e. Black Death of 1300's for Europeans, Chattel slavery in the United States for Africans, the Jewish Holocaust ... Indigenous people of North America have endured apocalypse as their way of life was violently removed from them. Charleston asks what do they have to say about living through apocalypse? What is called for by spiritual people in these times of change driven by hatred and violence?

He suggests that we can be guided by in these times by 4 native prophets and the example of the Hopi Nation all of who lived through true times of apocalypse.

- Ganiodaiio (handsome Lake) Haudenosaunee Confederacy Seneca
 - He showed us that each of us is responsible for what is happening around us. We cannot avoid or evade that responsibility.
- Tenskwatawa Shawnee
 - He showed us the need for a fixed place to take a stand. This is not a time to be on the sand of endless competition for power and wealth, but a solid foundation which we build together
- Smohalla Wanapams Community
 - He showed us that the core of our survival is not technological or utilitarian but relational.
 Relational to each other and the creation
- Wovoka -Northern Paiute
 - He showed us that truth and reconciliation is the process we must engage, no matter how painful it may be.
- Hopi Nation
 - They learned and showed us that all the above is part of a ancient and mysterious story that we are all a part of. When we travel through sacred space with an open heart and mind, we find life in the midst of the death (physical and spiritual) around us.

These spiritual leaders from the past and the Hopi nation of the present challenge us directly to engage in this world in a way that acknowledges that the times are changing, the future is here and now for us to live into.

How do we as Friends/Quakers enter into our responsibility to the world in this very moment? What does our faith provide us so we are not standing on shifting sand? In an age of AI, social Media (Technology) how do we engage relationally across differences? Reconciliation in a world driven by power – Is a pacifist belief naive? Was Jesus naive? What new life does our Faith draw us into?

Perhaps friends may want to share about their thoughts on these topics.

Apache Stronghold's Brief to the US Supreme Court

Update: During the 9th month Business Meeting the Right Relationship working group requested that our Monthly Meeting sign on to a legal brief to the United States Supreme Court requesting it to hear a case to repeal the transfer of Apache Sacred Land under the care of the US Forest Service to a foreign mining company. Our Monthly Meeting was in unity with taking this action. The paperwork was submitted and accepted listing our Monthly Meeting in the Brief field with the Supreme court.



We received this email from Christopher Mills - Spero Law LLC, one of the Lawyers for Apache Stronghold

As you may have seen, the Supreme Court today denied review of this case, over a <u>dissent</u>* written by Justice Gorsuch and joined by Justice Thomas. While today's result is deeply disappointing, I understand that the legal team at Becket is considering all possible legal options for preserving Oak Flat, including potentially seeking rehearing from the Supreme Court and asserting additional claims when the case is remanded to the district court. I know they are very grateful for your support of religious freedom and of Oak Flat.

News from the School


88th Annual Strawberry Festival
